

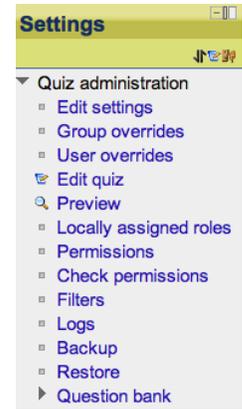
USING QUIZZES

TO ASSESS LEARNING

A **quiz** can be incorporated into your Moodle courses in a variety of ways. Moodle offers a variety of question types to assess student learning. Teachers should consider which type aligns with the purpose and content of the course. Every question will be stored in the question bank, which makes them available to be re-used in different quizzes.

Teachers can personalize quizzes in a variety of ways to best suit the needs of their courses. Options are available to customize:

- Timing
- Grading methods
- Layout of questions
- Question behavior
- Review/feedback



QUESTION TYPES:

- Calculated
Numerical questions (allow the use of wildcards, or variable names such as 'x' or 'y')
- Matching
Provides a list of sub-questions and answers, and requires students to make matches from the categories
- Short Answer
Student-generated responses range from a single word to a phrase or sentence
- Description
Prints texts/graphics to provide information for the following question(s), but doesn't require an answer
- Embedded Answers
Multiple questions are asked through blanks in one passage of text (multiple choice, short answer, numerical)
- Numerical
Similar to short answer questions, but allow for a range of answers to be pre-determined
- Essay
Requires the student to provide an answer in a more-structured essay format
- Multiple Choice
Students choose the correct answer from multiple possibilities
- True/False
Students determine whether a statement (or aspect/component of an image) is valid or not.

HOW TO CREATE A QUIZ:

- 1) Add a *Quiz* in the designated category.
- 2) Enter a *Name* for the quiz and an *Introduction*, if necessary. Then, use the remaining options to further design your quiz.
- 3) To start adding questions, click directly on the quiz name (on the course home page) and then *Edit quiz*.
- 4) Select the *Add question* button, and on the next screen, choose the question type and click *Next*.
- 5) Fill in the question form and give a grade to the correct answer. Select *Save changes*.
- 6) Continue adding questions until the quiz is complete.
